TERRATOR



Neil Adams' new work TERRATOR is set to the insistent and complex music of contemporary New York composer Michael Gordon. The work explores aspects of restriction, aggression and suppression through abstract movement. At times the choreography is harsh and cutting, and demands a high level of commitment from the performers.

The structure of the dance reflects the sense of tension and expectancy which is present in the music. The choreography builds in intensity and complexity towards the climactic ending.

Choreographed by Neil Adams

Neil Adams began his career in 1981 as a founding member of Tasdance. He performed, taught and choreographed with the company for 10 years. Neil continued to freelance as a teacher, performer and choreographer after he left Tasdance and in 1995 accepted the position of Lecturer in Contemporary Dance at the Western Australian Academy of Performing Arts.

Neil's choreography has been presented successfully at the WUDAO Festival in Beijing 1994, the KIDE Festival in Seoul 1995, and for the Greenmill World Dance Alliance Conference, Melbourne 1996.



New Zealand born Lucette Aldous has had an illustrious international dance career after being encouraged by the late Sir Robert Helpmann to attend London's Royal Ballet School.

She subsequently joined Ballet Rambert, and from 1963-67 was a ballerina with the London Festival Ballet. She trained intensively in Paris and St Petersburg with highly acclaimed Russian teachers such as Sophia Golovkina (Director of the Bolshoi Ballet School) and has danced with the Royal Ballet as a principal artist.

Her career has seen her dance with such luminaries as Nureyev and Baryshnikov.

Lucette has been invited to conduct various national and international master classes, including classes for the Australian Ballet Co, WA Ballet Co and the Royal Academy of Dancing.



Tu-tu Wha

The shifting paradigms of revolution, takeover and change.

Tu-tu Wha traces the history of the French Revolution from the moment of Marie Antoinette's beheading, triggering this middle section of the work, also called *Harmonielehre*, concerned with takeover and violence.

After the revolution we are left with cosmic flotsam and jetsam and a time of calm but only after we have ruined everything and exhausted ourselves.

Nothing is quite as it was. We never seem to learn.

Harmonielehre, the middle section of Leigh Warren's full length Tu-tu Wha, is reproduced by the original performers – Sue Peacock and Paul O'Sullivan.

Choreographer: Leigh Warren

Leigh Warren trained at the Australian Ballet School and the Juilliard School of Music, New York. He spent his dancing career with both Australian and international companies, including Ballet Rambert and the Netherlands Dance Theatre. Leigh returned to Australia in 1986 and took up the directorship of the Australian Dance Theatre in 1987. In 1993 he formed his own company, Leigh Warren and Dancers, touring the company to Holland, Singapore, London, Indonesia, Korea and all mainland states of Australia. In 1997 Leigh Warren and Dancers received the inaugural Adelaide Critics' Circle award for "Outstanding Achievement by a Group" for Leigh's Work *Shimmer*, part of his highly acclaimed *Quiver* programme.

Music: This section of Tu-tu Wha is set to the first movement of a John Adams' symphony, Harmonielehre, which means "a lesson in harmony".

Set to nine songs from composer Lindsay Vickery's music of the same name, Lenny Westerdyk's choreography is stark and emotive. The dancers are working with a dissonant score, accompanied by a text of a very emotional nature: "Stay, talk, lift me up, lift me."

The piece is not so much about steps but how the dancers perform it. The dancers were asked to think about their emotional connections with the movement. There is a strong emphasis on personal interpretation.

Choreographer: Lenny Westerdyk and cast

Lenny Westerdyk was born in the Netherlands, where she became a dancer for the Netherlands Dance Theatre, before going to London to join Ballet Rambert and the London Contemporary Dance Theatre. She later moved to Australia and the Australian Dance Theatre, lectured in dance at QUT, VCA, and WAAPA where she was Head of the Dance Department. Recently she performed in 'Brecht's Women' at His Majesty's with Cathie Travers and Academy student Melissa Madden Grey, under the direction of Jim Hughes.
